Trustees Honor Citizen Hero



"I've never had anything like this happen to me," Mr. Cox said. "I'm so thankful to be recognized."

Despite the images portrayed by Hollywood, real heroes don't wear capes and use supernatural powers to capture villains.

Mr. Joseph Cox is a good example.

On the evening of December 15, 2021, as he was driving near the intersection of Needmore Road and Webster Street, he came across an accident. He stopped and got out of his car to see if anyone needed his help. As he approached the wreck, he noticed a man inside, unresponsive. At that point, the 37-year-old Mr. Cox tried to open the door, but damage from the accident made that impossible.

Moments later he noticed fire coming from under the hood. Without regard for his own safety, he quickly smashed out the window and pulled the driver to safety.

For his selfless act in a life-or-death emergency, Harrison Township trustees presented Mr. Cox a proclamation detailing his heroism.

"I've never had anything like this happen to me," Mr. Cox said. "I'm so thankful to be recognized."

New Trustee Brings Fresh Perspective

The newest – and youngest ever – Harrison Township trustee began her two-year term of office in January 2022. In addition to a youthful perspective, Danielle Bradley brings a knack for listening and understanding, along with a desire to serve the community.

"I want people to feel heard and feel comfortable voicing their concerns and wishes," the 36-year old said.

Danielle believes the township's strategic plan identifies the most important issues facing the community,

including updating the zoning code, rebuilding from the 2019 tornadoes, attracting businesses and ensuring affordable housing. She's also committed to providing the Montgomery County Sheriff's Office the resources needed to keep the community safe.

"As a young trustee, I bring a fresh set of ideas from a different demographic," she said. "I'm a voice for the young families and citizens that did not have a 'seat at the table.'"

Danielle is employed as a recruiter for Monterey Consultants, working on a contract with the U.S. Department of Labor.



New Commander a Familiar Face

A two-time Montgomery County Sheriff’s Office Deputy of the Year has been named as Harrison Township’s new substation commander. Captain Brad Daugherty, a 24-year veteran of the office, now leads the department of 34 deputies and sergeants. He was previously assigned to the township from 2000 to 2004 and worked as a road patrol officer and detective.

Captain Daugherty replaces Captain Dave Parin, who led the department for three years that included challenges such as the 2019 tornadoes and COVID-19.

Having grown up in Clay Township, Captain Daugherty earned an Associate of Applied Science Degree in Law Enforcement/Criminal Justice from Sinclair College. The 43-year old began his career with the sheriff’s office as a corrections officer in 1998 and was promoted to deputy sheriff in 2000. He has worked in jail operations, road patrol, community-oriented policing and field training.

As a detective from 2004 to 2018, Captain Daugherty worked high-profile cases, including robberies, rapes and homicides. He is also an active member of the Montgomery County Regional SWAT Team.

Once promoted to sergeant in 2018, and then captain in 2019, he was assigned to the jail division before returning to Harrison Township.



The new commander’s goal is to make deputies more visible and promote positive relationships with citizens – especially youth – to create a safer community.

Captain Daugherty is also known as Vice Mayor Daugherty as a member of the Englewood City Council. He has also coached numerous youth sports teams. He and his wife of 22 years, Kristie, have four children. They live in Englewood.

Deputy Earns Sheriff’s Top Honor

One of Harrison Township’s hardest working sheriff’s deputies has been named Deputy of the Year by the Montgomery County Sheriff’s Office. Assigned to road patrol last year, Deputy Alec Denker, responded to more than 920 incidents and completed 285 reports. His record for felony arrests was unmatched in the

entire sheriff’s office, and he was also responsible for getting many intoxicated drivers off the road.

“Deputy Denker’s direct supervisors praise his professionalism and work ethic every day,” said Harrison Township Substation Commander Captain Brad Daugherty, who nominated the deputy for the sheriff’s office-wide award. Denker earlier was honored as Harrison Township’s Deputy of the Year.

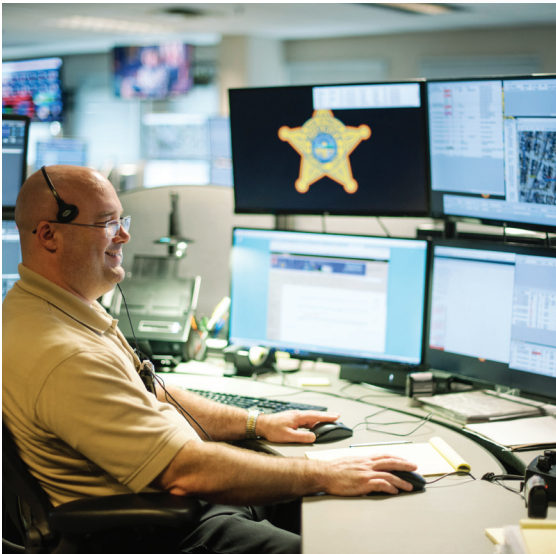
Board of Trustees Meeting Schedule

In an Emergency...

In a life-or-death emergency involving injury to someone or property damage, calling 9-1-1 is the fastest way to connect with the police, fire and emergency medical services.

But when the need is not immediate and life-threatening – to report a barking dog or abandoned vehicle, for example – the Montgomery County Sheriff’s Office provides an easy-to-remember non-emergency number: (937) 225-HELP (4357).

All calls are answered by the Regional Dispatch Center, and responders who are appropriate to the situation are dispatched from there.



Township Goes Extra Mile for Safety

When it comes to keeping roadways safe, Harrison Township makes a practice of exceeding minimum state requirements. Although state law requires twice yearly mowing of public rights-of-way – those areas along the edge of the road that are not in front of homes and businesses – the township performs the maintenance at least three times.

“This maintenance task is much too important,” said Service Department Director Merle Cyphers. “It reduces collection points for litter, and increases safety for our residents. It also improves the appearance of the township in general.”

It requires up to 80 hours of labor to complete a pass through the entire township.

Litter Hurts You

Litter is a global problem: It harms wildlife, pollutes rivers and contaminates soil. On a community level, it detracts from the ability to attract new businesses and residents.

The litter problem in Harrison Township is typical. Among the items that litter local streets are cigarette butts, food wrappers, plastic bottles and grocery bags.

Don't be a litterbug, please throw trash in the trash can, where it belongs, and teach your children to do the same.

Prepared for Road Repairs

With the threat of snowy, icy weather passed, the township's first priority for keeping roadways safe is patching rough spots and repairing potholes. After that, officials survey roadway conditions across the township and develop a resurfacing plan for the coming season.

The 2022 paving budget of \$465,000 will cover the resurfacing of 4.5 miles. Grant funding – which the township has applied for but not yet notified of an award – would pay for additional miles of resurfacing.



Hydrant Testing May Discolor Water

The Harrison Township Fire Department will be testing fire hydrants from May 2 through May 22. It's best to check before doing laundry since this may stir up sediment in the water lines and cause the water to be discolored.

Program Limits Flooding

Like vehicles, household plumbing, the internet and so many other conveniences, it's easy to take for granted the systems that make life more comfortable – until something goes wrong. A community's storm drainage system is one such system: It only becomes noticeable after it malfunctions.

To prevent surprises, the Harrison Township Services Department carries out an annual storm-drainage maintenance program across all 83 miles of the township's underground storm drains and open ditches that keep street flooding at bay. The program will be carried out through the month of April.

“We identify potential storm drain blockages and clean that area of the system with a specialized truck designed for this use,” said Services Department Director Merle Cyphers.

Additional cleaning is performed on a request basis.

“The most important thing that property owner can do to assist in keeping the storm system functioning is to ensure the areas around the inlets stay clear of litter and grass clippings,” said Cyphers. “Litter and environmental waste are the main causes of blockage.”

Township to Update Zoning Laws

The average citizen doesn't spend much time thinking about zoning or the role it plays in a community – until a new business decides to erect an oversized sign or a developer wants to build a high-rise in a suburban neighborhood.

The primary purpose of zoning is to ensure that land uses are compatible, prevent new development from interfering with existing uses and preserve a given area's character. It keeps factories out of residential neighborhoods, for example.

Harrison Township's strategic plan prioritizes updated zoning regulations to align them with today's markets and lifestyles. A comprehensive review and revision of the community's zoning maps and regulations has not been completed in recent history.

The time is right because new opportunities have emerged since the 2019 tornadoes wiped out entire swaths of residential and commercial development in the township. The existing zoning in these areas may be too restrictive to realize their potential in today's marketplace.

Before the Harrison Township Board of Trustees adopts any changes to the zoning code, citizens will have opportunities to review and comment on the recommendations.

Household Trash: Contain It

One trash and one recycling container are included in your residential trash bills. All trash must fit inside these containers with the lid closed. Overage bags are available at the Harrison Township Government Center for \$4 per bag, or additional containers may be rented for \$3 per month, billed a year in advance.



Why Does Zoning Matter?

The Wagner-Ford and North Dixie corridor was hit hard by the 2019 tornadoes. Now this prominent area presents the opportunity to reimagine its future.

Unfortunately, the township's decades-old zoning code limits the possibilities.

As part of the ongoing zoning code update, the township has declared a one-year moratorium on any new development in that area. Meanwhile, the development department is conducting a market analysis and will recommend new development standards that maximize the area's potential.

"This is our chance to ensure we get the kind of development the community wants and needs in this area," said Development Director Emily Crow. "We want to seize this opportunity for comprehensive redevelopment."



Community Meetings: Residents Come to Listen, Learn and Help

With 30 people participating in the township's quarterly community outreach meeting in December and about 25 in March, attendance far surpassed expectations.

The township is holding the meetings as part of the strategic planning process, in an effort to learn citizens' concerns, priorities and suggestions.

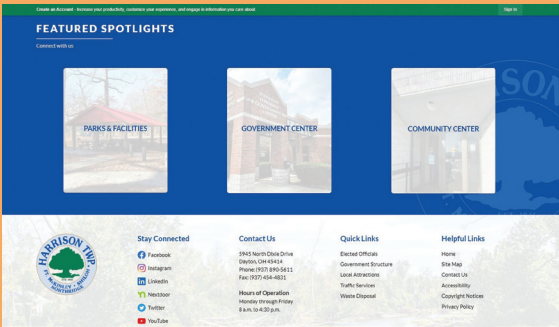
"We want to invite citizens into the strategic planning process and ask them to tell us what's important to them now and in the future," said Development Director Emily Crow.

One result of the first meeting was a citizen-driven network of support groups that represent the philanthropic community, programs for seniors, food pantries and faith-based groups that will meet regularly to coordinate the response to residents in need.

More Eyesores Coming Down

When abandoned houses turn into dilapidated eyesores, the problem is more than cosmetic: They diminish residents' safety and health, as well as neighborhood appeal and property values.

These are among the reasons Harrison Township is aggressive in pursuing the removal of abandoned nuisance properties. The township has gained outside funding to supplement local tax dollars as part of this effort.

Officials are now approaching the end of a long legal process that will allow for the demolition of 15 properties that have been declared dangerous, including some abandoned after the 2019 tornadoes.

Township Increases Resources for Nuisance Cleanup

Harrison Township has deployed a new strategy to keep up the community's appearance. Contracted firms will help to clean up nuisance properties, including mowing overgrown weeds and grass, as well as junk removal. This work becomes necessary after property owners fail to comply with notices of property maintenance violation.

In the past, this work was completed by services department crews at a cost last year of \$90,000. These costs are assessed to the property owner's tax bill, but not all can be collected.

This work becomes challenging during the summer months, however, because crews must also work on to road repairs, right-of-way mowing, park maintenance and other summer projects.

Harrison Township trustees decided this year to supplement the cleanup effort with contractors so that major nuisance concerns can be scheduled more quickly.



Spring Cleaning Simplified

If your spring cleaning has you disposing of large, bulky items, the following is news you need to know.

Harrison Township's contract with the residential trash hauler, Rumpke, includes bulk item pick-up at no additional cost to residents. You may set out up to three bulky items per week for collection on your regular trash pick-up day.

Bulky-item guidelines

- If you're disposing of upholstered items, such as couches, chairs, mattresses and box springs, those items must be wrapped and sealed in plastic. Containment bags for this purpose can be purchased for \$7 per bag at the Harrison Township Government Center.
 - TV sets may not exceed 32 inches.
 - Freon must be removed from appliances such as dehumidifiers and air conditioners before pickup. Please complete a refrigerant recovery statement and contact Rumpke for more details.
 - Items such as drywall, concrete, bricks, dirt or rocks, are not accepted.
 - By federal law, Rumpke may not accept batteries, tires, liquids, combustible materials or any items identified as hazardous.
 - Please remove safety hazards to help keep drivers safe.

Company Growing, Adding Jobs in Township

A local company has launched a new phase in its trajectory toward premier status in its industry. Dedicated to aggressive growth, Budde Precision Machining has just completed a relocation within Harrison Township that quadruples its space and sets the stage for expansion over the next 15 to 20 years.

The company provides prototype-to-production computer numerical control (CNC) machining to high-profile industries, including defense, aerospace, health care/medical and industrial equipment.

Outstanding growth

Bursting at the seams in its former 5,000-square-foot Wadsworth Road location, the company recently purchased and relocated to a vacant, 20,000-square-foot facility at 2608 Nordic Ave.

Budde’s sales have soared in recent years, resulting in a significant backlog of orders. Current employment stands at 13, but owner Mike Budde envisions increasing employment significantly in the near future. Many of the jobs will be high-value machining/engineering positions.

Customer partnerships

“We partner with our customers and will grow in lockstep with them,” he said. “Our close customer relationships have built their trust in us as a vendor.”

The new facility will require \$155,000 in improvements, including a new roof and energy-efficiency upgrades. Harrison Township recently assisted Budde in obtaining a \$200,000 economic development grant from Montgomery County’s ED/GE program to help pay for the improvements.

“We looked at quite a few new locations but decided to stay because it’s convenient to so many of our vendors and the interstates,” Budde said. “And the township’s staff have been great to work with. They have the expertise to get things done.”

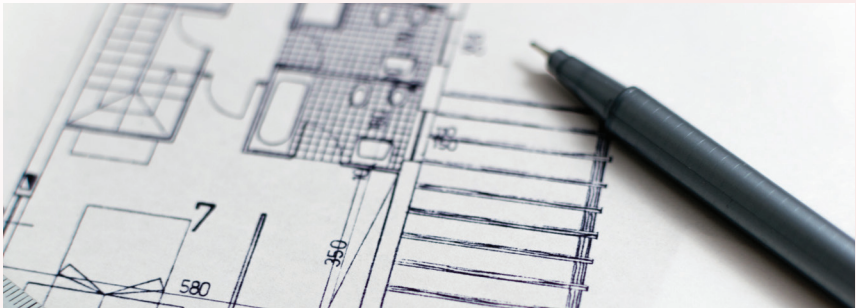
